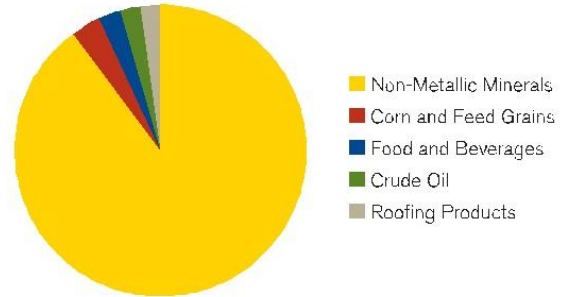

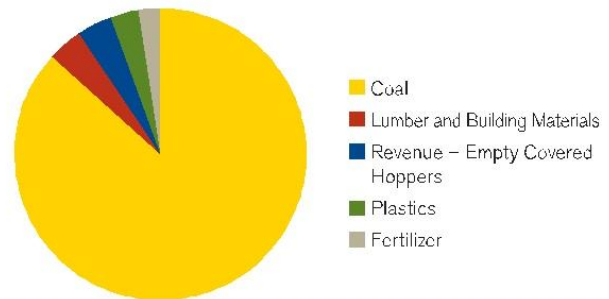

## Union Pacific's Wisconsin heritage

The first rails of what would eventually become part of Union Pacific in Wisconsin were laid in 1858 north of Hudson on the St. Croix River. That line, along with various short lines that sprang up across the state, became part of a regional system that grew into Chicago & North Western (C&NW), chartered in Illinois and Wisconsin in 1859.

C&NW can trace its ancestry to several railroads, including Galena & Chicago Union Railroad, West Wisconsin Railroad, and Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha Railway, popularly known as the "Omaha Road." The Omaha Road extended from the Twin Cities to Duluth on Lake Superior, and to Chicago and Omaha. C&NW gained control of the Omaha Road in 1882, but operated it as a separate company until 1957.

### Union Pacific in Wisconsin

Union Pacific crosses Wisconsin from Superior in the northwest to Milwaukee in the southeast. Main line tracks run from the Twin Cities on the western border across the state to Milwaukee and south along Lake Michigan into Chicago.

Major commodities handled by the railroad include coal, frac sand, automobiles, auto parts, potash and supplies for malt houses and flour mills.

From 2009 to 2013, Union Pacific's capital investment in Wisconsin was nearly \$100 million.

### Supporting the communities we serve

In 2013, Union Pacific provided support to 25 charitable organizations in Wisconsin, including Workforce Resource, Family Resource Center St. Croix Valley and Positive Alternatives. These organizations were reached through a combination of the Union Pacific Foundation, matching gifts and corporate contributions.
